

Walk 7: Sol Joel Park and High Wood

A flat walk which links Sol Joel Park with High Wood. Some walking on pavements is required. The route may be lengthened by one mile (1.6km) at point **12** to include a circuit of South Lake.

Length

2.5 miles (4 km). Allow 1 hour 15 mins plus stops.

Route Instructions (See map attached for numbered points)









Turn left, cross Mays Close and the A3290 and take the footpath over the railway. Continue on the pavement, past St Peter's School and the Church on your left. The entrance to Sol Joel Park is on your left at the end of the churchyard. This is point **(22)** below. *St Peters Church was built in 1844 and extended in 1882/3. The Porter Institute (built 1896), now the school reception, was the Working Men's Club and named after Thomas Porter (Whiteknights Park) its founder.*



Walk carefully along the path at the side of the entrance to the park. You should now be back where you started! The park is named after Soloman Barnato Joel, a self-made man and diamond dealer, who owned the Maiden Erlegh Estate from 1903 to 1931. In 1927 he donated £10,000 and 20 acres of land to the National Playing Fields Association. The land was developed into a park for the recreational use of families from Reading.



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
